### **CIVIL SERVICE - CAREERS COMPETITION**

Congratulations to Year 10 for taking part in our Civil Service Careers competition this term. As part of the challenge, they had to work within a team and show creativity in proposing ideas of how the different departments in the civil service could work to solve problems within a fictional town. They also had to allocate the funding that would be appropriate for each of their suggestions. Each progress group then held a vote where every team had to discuss and present their ideas and, as a class, they decided which group's proposals would be the most effective.

The proposals were sent to the Civil Service and a panel of 10 judges within the Department for Work and Pensions chose their favourite two groups out of the four that were submitted. Mr Allum and Miss Fuller's group entries will be completed next term. Unfortunately, the judges weren't able to make it to assembly as planned but they were very complimentary of the quality of all of the entries that they saw and are looking forward to working with us later in the year.

### **BULLYING UPDATE**

Since I last wrote to you regarding bullying we have seen a good level of success with many cases of alleged bullying through the use of our high profile reporting email and our new and clear "line in the sand" bullying policy. This has started to reduce the number of instances we are seeing across the school and we continue to work on this and raise awareness of bullying, how to report bullying and how we can manage these often complex situations. It continues to mostly effect girls, often in year 8, 9 and 10 and 95% of the cases we currently deal with involve multiple students on social media outside of school. I refer to my concerns regarding the impact of social media elsewhere in this newsletter.

However, there is no magic wand to wave and solve this issue, we are very aware that some of these issues continue to cause upset, anxiety and anger in those who experience this.

We will continue to make this our priority.

## **VAPING / E- CIGARETTES**

As you will probably have seen when out and about there is currently a significant increase in the amount of young people vaping. Thankfully, we barely ever see or hear of cigarette use in or around school these days, but this is now creeping back via an increase in student's vaping.

The low cost of single use vapes makes these very accessible to children and unsurprisingly they have very quickly made their way into the hands of our students. Social media has also had a big influence on this.

We have had to make a significant number of exclusions recently where students have been caught vaping in our toilets or on the buses/outside the school gates.

# Some key facts:

- Most vapes contain nicotine, which we all know is addictive.
- Nicotine products are illegal to sell or supply to anyone under the age of 18.

- E cigarettes are only recommended for use by existing smokers.
- Vaping is harder to catch/spot than smoking as it often smells less and is easier to conceal.
- This is happening at all schools and in wider society, not just Wrotham.
- We are aware of shops breaking the law and selling vapes to younger customers without challenge.

The same school rules apply to vaping as smoking – a 1 day internal or external suspension for use of or possession in school/on the journey to and from school. This escalates for repeated offences. Please can you discuss vaping with your child, remind them that it is prohibited and make them aware of the consequences both in terms of the law, school rules and their health.

Again, a culture of openness, honesty and clear boundaries with students is important.

## **OPEN EVENTS**

Thank you to all of our staff and students who were involved in our open events for prospective students. During term one we were visited by over 2000 families and the school remains as popular as ever. We were able to treat our visitors to tours of the school, music performances and close up experiences of our sport and drama extra-curricular work.

We know this is an anxious and nail-biting time for parents making their choice of schools and hope we have gone some way to giving families the information they need to make the best choice for their child.

## **Team Debut**

Jason spoke confidently to all students about employability skills, character traits and career opportunities in Sport. Students demonstrated excellent openmindedness and respect throughout with some asking great questions to further their knowledge and understanding. Jason spoke about his own background and how he started out in the Sport Sector which really engaged the students throughout and left students thinking about various higher education pathways in Sport. Students went away with information booklets with sport specific careers to consider and look into.

Despite the common view, it is not a necessity of modern life, no one has to use social media and there is a good chance that it has moved from being a convenience or social opportunity to being a dangerous distraction from the real world or worse, an addiction for many young people.

For Wrotham School, 2022 has been another very successful DofE year. We had a record number of students participating with thirty-eight Bronze candidates passing their assessed expedition; they demonstrated great Teamwork, Communication, Resilience and Compassion over two challenging expedition events. This cohort are now finishing their Volunteering, Skill and Physical sections and we look forward to celebrating with them when they achieve their awards in January.

We are also excited to welcome our new Bronze cohort to the programme. These Year 9 students have shown Open-Mindedness and Motivation by enrolling onto the award and will begin their DofE journey in the New Year.

These new participants will be joining our current year 11 Silver cohort who, alongside their studies, are completing a physical activity, learning a new skill and are volunteering in the local community. In the New Year they will also start planning for their expedition in the Summer.

It has been a real pleasure to see how the students have gained so much from taking on the challenge of the Duke of Edinburgh's Award. They have developed skills and had experiences that will stay with them for a very long time.

### **MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORT - THE MAC TEAM**

Many of you will know that our MAC team is based in school to support students with their day to day safeguarding, wellbeing and mental health. This year they have expanded their work to meet the needs of more students through group sessions, this has allowed us to support even more young people with issues such as anxiety, self-confidence and mental health.

### **Student Feedback**

To give you an idea of the incredible impact that the team has with our students we have collated some of their anonymised feedback below:

'Now I can think why am I feeling this way and look to change my thought. I've learnt how to do that in therapy. It's a lot more manageable and I've learnt that not every person is bad. I've learnt to like myself a lot more because of working on recognising my strengths and qualities.'

'All in all I feel a lot better in myself. My confidence has improved. I still have emotional days that I sometimes can't control but it is a lot less. I have quite a few anxiety techniques now.'

'It has helped my thoughts — I can approach things better and take time before reacting to them to think about it.'

'It's helped me to identify positives in myself and make the right choices. I have more self-esteem, I'm able to talk about myself and know who I am, I couldn't do that before. I am thinking more positively.'

'Being able to explore all my different emotions and know how I'm feeling! I feel different, ever since I've been coming to therapy I've felt happier and situations are different.'

If you would like your child to get support from this team please contact your child's HOY to request support. This will be triaged according to urgency of need by the team.

### **ART THERAPY**

The Intervention Team, in collaboration with the Art Department, trialled an art therapy group for some students in different year groups. We have delivered another two art therapy groups since September which have both been successful. Students in the groups have had the opportunity to express themselves in a creative way and practice mindfulness as a way of looking after their mental health. ### **DISCO FEVER**



At the end of term 1 Year 7, 8 and 9 students had their reward discos. There was a lot of fancy dress and dancing and everyone had lots of fun – music was provided by DJ Pickles and our year 8 team also raised over £150 to support the school fund with 5 students cooking over 40 homemade pizzas as part of the fund raising. Behaviour of the students at all of the events was exceptional and created a wonderful, fun opportunity for them to celebrate their success and let their hair down.

### **HISTORY CLUB**


