CANTEEN UPDATE

In Term 2 we introduced big changes to our canteen and food provision at the school.

I am sure your child will confirm and agree that the menu range and quality of food provided has improved significantly over the last few weeks and students are enjoying a fantastic provision of home cooked food and snacks. The new canteen leadership team has reviewed our food offer and will continue to listen to students to make any ongoing improvements.

I receive many anecdotal reports from other schools that school food has become increasingly bland and overpriced in recent years. At Wrotham School we employ our own independent team that ensures that the food is always prepared and cooked "in house" and is fresh and tasty. We don't have to cut the corners required by profit making external providers and this means our food retains the quality, quantity and variation you would want for your child.

Running a school canteen is not without challenge; we feed over 950 students twice per day and can normally serve over 600 hungry students in 15 minutes during a busy lower school lunch period. This efficiency ensures that students get fed and still have ample time to eat, play and socialise.

From January 2024 there will be a small increase in the cost of food. We have not increased prices for over 5 years but costs from suppliers have risen with steep inflation and we have to reflect these changes.

We have ensured that healthy foods and drinks are protected from these increases and that any other uplift is minimal. Most children, who have a main meal, snack and drink will only see an overall increase of between 30p and 50p in total. This will not impact students who receive free school meals. We feel this is reasonable and fair and will ensure we can continue to provide generous portions of good quality food.

Please also remember that we continue to provide **free** breakfast cereal in the mornings for any students who wants to grab breakfast when they arrive.

UNIFORM

Thank you for your support with uniform this year. Visitors to the school always pass comment on how smart our students look; big improvements have also been seen in PE with more students bringing correct kit to lessons. As uniform wears and tears over the course of a term at school, it is important that, if needed, any broken or worn items are replaced over the break for a fresh start in January. We will be checking uniform with the students in the first week back.

If your child has any false nails or similar put on over the festive period, please can you make sure these, along with any other items such as false eyelashes, rings, jewellery, face tattoos (©) etc, are removed before we return.

Trainers have also become an increasing issue. We are very clear on this, we do not permit trainers of any colour in school. Please do not listen to shoe shops who tell you that their trainers are suitable for school, they rarely are. If you are unsure please ask us before buying them so we can save time and money in letting you know if they are suitable or not. School shoes are what everyone knows to be smart leather shoes, without labels and are not made by Nike, Reebok or Addidas! For example – Air Force One Nike trainers are not school shoes and at £100 a pair, they never have been.


Getting uniform right makes the start to the new term run that much more smoothly without time wasted on discussion about uniform.

ART THERAPY

As you may know our school psychotherapist and Art Department lead run an Art Therapy intervention for students to support their good mental health and wellbeing through art and creative expression.

Below are examples of Year 7 Transition Collages symbolising emotions and grounding doodles. Year 7's selected shapes to represent different emotions. Shapes and colour washes were used to devise an abstract composition that maps out their transition from primary to secondary school. Students were asked to represent the feelings and emotions they felt before starting Wrotham School. As the shapes travel across the paper, they transform into new shapes to symbolise how they are feeling now.



FIRST AID TRAINING

In October, groups of Year 7, 8, 9 and 12 students spent the morning learning first aid and CPR from trained paramedics. This was an incredible experience for these students equipping them with life-saving skills, fostering empathy, responsibility and leadership. It nurtures character development by instilling a sense of compassion and preparedness. Our students were incredible ambassadors for the school and showed outstanding character in their approach to such a serious topic.

MATHS CHALLENGE

On 21st November, four year 11 students took part in a mathematics challenge at Invicta Grammar School, in Maidstone, against other local schools including local grammar schools. The competition consisted of paired and group activities where they had to think critically and problem solve. Our students displayed excellent character by showing respect to the other competitors, resilience in their effort to answer all questions and integrity by representing the school with pride. As well as having fun, the students did themselves proud by placing 4th.
